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A Message from Chief Executive Officer, Dale Morrissey...

In the last couple of issues of *DSCommunity News* we have felt it was important to talk about the state budget situation, and it is always our hope that by July we are communicating decisions; however, there is no budget. We want to share with you what we know as it directly relates to DSC.

As of July 1st there is still no budget in place for the state of Illinois which means there is a great deal up in the air and changing daily. Through our state association, Illinois Association of Rehabilitation Facilities (IARF), and other statewide organizations, information on the impact of the lack of a state budget is being given to state lawmakers on a regular basis so they are aware of the hardships that are being created. It is difficult to share detailed information, as it is changing so quickly, but we assure you that DSCs board and management team are working diligently through this process.

DSC and Community Elements were contacted by IARF in late June and asked to be a venue for a press conference that was held on June 29th at DSC. This request was initiated from groups in Springfield that organized to help share the realities of how lives would be affected after July 1st when these programs are suspended or eliminated. While DSC and Community Elements had individuals speak at the press conference, there were also other groups represented, such as those receiving services from the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program and Nurses Association.

As always, we will continue to advocate on behalf of all people with disabilities receiving DSC services at the local and state levels. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact us.

Sometimes, people just need a little extra help in order to help themselves.

This is true of many consumers at DSC and certainly true of Debbie, who has intellectual disabilities and a few health problems, including diabetes and arthritis. Debbie first began receiving services from DSC in 1991, receiving only Case Management Services. Her Case Manager, Lori, provided assistance with referrals, treatment monitoring and follow up, and advocacy among other things. While these services proved useful, Lori soon realized that Debbie was not living to her highest possible level of health and independence. Specifically, Debbie had some trouble in the areas of work motivation, personal care, and apartment keeping. To get more support, Debbie began to receive Apartment Services in 2012, and was able to develop and maintain skills necessary to successfully live independently in the community. The difference has been incredible! With



the added help of Debbie's Apartment Services Case Manager, she was able to make positive changes to her living habits, which have resulted in a higher overall quality of life, as well as an increased amount of independence. Debbie now has an increased level of work motivation, is able to keep up with taking her medications on her own, takes pride in her appearance, and even looks for opportunities to exercise! Way to go, Debbie!

Page 3 Employment First

Employment First is modeled from a national movement that deems employment in the general workforce as the first and preferred option when exploring goals and a life path for people with disabilities.

In February 2015, DSC submitted a grant request to the Champaign County Developmental Disabilities Board in collaboration with Community Choices, a local cooperative, to make Employment First a priority to our community. We are very excited that this grant request was recently funded for FY16 which began formally on July 1st. The focus of this grant is to develop the infrastructure to support Employment First for Champaign County.

Areas of focus over the next 12 – 24 months will include: Individual and Family educational/ informational events; Staff training/consultation to facilitate a quicker shift in culture for increased community and employment focused outcomes; Business/Employer outreach; and efforts to influence System Reform at the state level.

Caregiver Connections at DSC

A home child care provider in Homer was concerned about the excessive tantrums that Harry, age 2, has when his mother leaves each day. He cries inconsolably each morning. The provider is unsure how to handle his behavior and the disruption to the other children in her care. Fortunately, she is able to contact *Caregiver Connections* to help her understand why Harry may be reacting this way, how to manage his behavior, and work with Harry's mother to ease this transition.

DSC recently became the recipient of the Caregiver Connections grant, administered by the Department of Human Services. We employ one Caregiver Connections Consultant to serve approximately 630 child care centers and day care homes in Iroqouis, Champaign, Vermilion, Macon, Piatt, and Douglas counties. For providers in both centers and homes, children with challenging behaviors can be a major source of stress and may lead to expulsion.

This unique program helps child care providers recognize, understand, and respond to the social emotional needs of children in their care. The mission is to promote the social emotional health of young children and families by strengthening the knowledge and competencies of early childhood teachers and caregivers. Research shows a clear relationship between a child's healthy social emotional development, success in childcare, and later success in school.

The Caregiver Connections Consultant collaborates with DSC staff and local and regional agencies: To strengthen skills to support a child's healthy social emotional development; To offer support in the development of partnerships between providers and parents; To help with problem-solving and working with parents on difficult issues; To provide timely, helpful training; To refer families to other services when needed.



Movie Premiere was a Huge Success!

DSC's Prompting Theater, the local CU theater troupe comprised of adult actors with developmental and intellectual disabilities, premiered their first movie, "Who Stole My Hoo-to Foo-to Boo-to Bah?" on Tuesday, April 21st at the Art Theater Co-op in downtown Champaign. Over 200 people attended this red carpet event (pictured at right)! The actors arrived in style, wearing red carpet formal wear, and riding in a limo. Lines formed to get autographs and pictures from the stars!



Other showings throughout that week were at SoDo Theater in Champaign, with over 600 people in total viewing the movie. Based on a songbook by Dr. Seuss, "Who Stole My Hoo-to Foo-to Boo-to



Bah?" was a result of the creativity of the actors and writers. After creating an original stage play in 2013, the Prompting Theater decided to transform that script into a screenplay rewriting it for the big screen. The actors took on this new challenge with amazing dedication, and studied acting for film for six months! The filmmaking experience was integrative and collaborative, with everyone –talent and crew - interacting as the professionals they are.

Members of the Diabetes Group, "Learning is Sweet" and "Health Matters" worked together to plan and present information at the health fair in April. Approximately 35 people came through the fair, which was run by 11 consumer volunteers and two staff. Many topics were covered, including: *Exercise, Diabetes Risk and Complications, Using my Plate for Healthy Nutrition, Sun Protection,* and *Proper Hand Washing*.

Everyone enjoyed the event, especially when some of the staff got "Sneezed" on by Sneezy Sam at the cold & flu station. As a result of a "sugar in your drink" station, there was one staff member who gave up soda completely! The presenters have even expressed interest in taking the health fair to upcoming community events, such as the Down Syndrome Network's Buddy Walk this fall!
